


Diocesan AI Symposium: AI is transforming society: Are Catholics ready?

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Pastor's Message

The first Canadian Thanksgiving - indeed, the First North American Thanksgiving - was celebrated in 1578 by the English mariner Sir Martin Frobisher and his crew. During a voyage to find the Northwest Passage (a passage between the Atlantic and Pacific Oceans through the Arctic), Frobisher's ships were dispersed by ice and storms. Upon safely reuniting in the inlet of Baffin Island later named Frobisher Bay, Frobisher and his men gave thanks to God for their "strange and miraculous deliverance in those so dangerous places."

In 1604, French settlers led by the explorer Samuel de Champlain arrived in modern-day Nova Scotia and established the colony of Port Royal, Acadia. To keep up the spirits of the settlers during the harsh Acadian winters, Champlain established the Order of Good Cheer, which held regular thanksgiving feasts. The French invited their First Nations neighbours to join them in these celebrations. (Champlain would go on to found Quebec City in 1608. He was a devout Catholic and supported the work of Franciscan and Jesuit missionaries in bringing the Gospel to the First Nations peoples of eastern Canada.)

After Confederation, Thanksgiving Day was declared a national holiday in 1879. Its celebration on the second Monday of October was decreed by an act of Parliament in 1957. The Act explicitly gave thanks to God, stating: "A Day of General Thanksgiving to Almighty God for the bountiful harvest with which Canada has been blessed - to be observed on the 2nd Monday in October."

In the Preface at Mass, the priest sings or says: "It is truly right and just, our duty and our salvation, always and everywhere, to give you thanks, Lord, holy Father, almighty and eternal God." To render thanks to God for all His gifts is a requirement of justice. The Mass is our supreme act of thanksgiving to God, for at every Mass, Jesus Christ, really present under the appearances of bread and wine, unites us to Himself in His sacrifice of praise, thanksgiving, and expiation to the Father. In fact, the word Eucharist means "thanksgiving."
